

## **2011 Request for Proposals**

# **Mid-Atlantic Panel on Aquatic Invasive Species (MAPAIS)**

**Program Description:** The Mid-Atlantic Regional Panel on Aquatic Invasive Species (MAPAIS) is composed of individuals representing federal and state agencies, regional and academic entities, and private environmental groups from the mid-Atlantic region. **MAPAIS Mission:** The mission of the MAPAIS is to assist state and federal agencies and other stakeholders in developing and implementing strategic, coordinated, and action-oriented approaches to preventing and controlling aquatic invasive species (AIS) in the mid-Atlantic region. The driving force behind our mission is to strengthen cooperation, coordination, and communication on AIS issues within the region and beyond.

Call for Proposals Summary: In 2011, the MAPAIS is offering a limited Small Grants Competition to encourage interested groups and individuals to submit proposals for possible funding. This announcement lists Panel priorities and provides information about the format and timetable for submitting proposals. We are encouraging broad participation from groups and individuals concerned about aquatic invasive species issues in the Mid-Atlantic region. A proposal submission must address an aquatic invasive species problem.

Full proposals due: April 1, 2011

**Program priorities:** Applicants are encouraged to submit proposals that include the following components:

- On- the-ground activities
  - eradication and control
  - > reporting and monitoring
  - > survey and risk assessment
  - vector management
  - > public education and outreach
- Relevance to the mission and priorities of MAPAIS
- Regional significance

 Substantial in-kind or cash contributions toward the project which can include indirect costs

The MAPAIS membership identified the following activities as high priorities for 2011. This is not an exclusive list and it is in no particular order. Projects that address related topics are also encouraged.

### 1) Encourage states to develop an AIS management plan

The MAPAIS recognizes state management plans can provide a catalyst for state and federal funding and resources. It is interested in funding proposals that contribute to the development of plans in Maryland, North Carolina, New Jersey, and West Virginia. In our region, Virginia, Delaware, Pennsylvania, and New York have completed state management plans. Some of these plans address both aquatic and terrestrial species (see plans at: <a href="http://www.midatlanticpanel.org/ais/mgtplans.htm">http://www.midatlanticpanel.org/ais/mgtplans.htm</a>).

### 2) Implement AIS management plans

Develop proposals that would implement management actions called for in state invasive species management plans and Chesapeake Bay Program Regional Management plans for *Phragmites*, purple loosestrife, water chestnut, nutria, mute swan, and zebra mussels (<a href="http://www.midatlanticpanel.org/ais/mgtplans.htm">http://www.midatlanticpanel.org/ais/mgtplans.htm</a>).

- 3) Build on current regional efforts in early detection and rapid response
  In early 2009, MAPAIS and Maryland Sea Grant completed a regional rapid response
  plan with funding from the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration. The
  plan emphasizes an Incident Command System approach to help initiate a
  synchronized response in the event of a new invasion in a state or watershed in the
  Mid-Atlantic region. For more information visit:

  Proposals are encouraged that further expand activities to strengthen early detection
  and rapid response effort.
- 4) Develop vector management strategies for states and the region
  In late 2009, the MAPAIS and Maryland Sea Grant held a workshop on vector management as a mechanism to prevent introductions of invasive species.
  Recommendations from the workshop included improving management of ship fouling and live bait as well as addressing other ship and live trade pathways.
  Proposals are encouraged that develop mechanisms for states and the region to pursue vector management options. Especially welcome are projects that relate to some facet of the live bait vector RFP released by Maryland Sea Grant in late October 2010 (http://www.mdsg.umd.edu/programs/research/funding/ais/) or to the MAPAIS Social Marketing Committee's activities related to limiting bait bucket introductions in the mid-Atlantic. - 5) Work with the Environmental Law Institute to examine regional coordination efforts for preventing the spread of AIS

The Environmental Law Institute's 2007 report "Halting the Invasion in the Chesapeake Bay: Preventing Aquatic Invasive Species Introduction through Regional Cooperation" provides a series of recommendations. Although the report focuses on the Chesapeake Bay watershed, many of the recommendations could be applied throughout the Mid-Atlantic region and encourages expanding their implementation to other states in the region. MAPAIS is interested in supporting proposals that respond to these specific report recommendations:

- Encourage interstate collaboration
- Enhance regional body interactions
- Address weaknesses in existing AIS prevention authorities
- Facilitate compliance with and enforcement of AIS prevention authorities
- Plan for AIS prevention on a regional level
- 6) Develop or use existing national databases to map distributions of AIS in the region Mapping of AIS to document species occurrence and distribution in the Mid-Atlantic region is an important and necessary tool for effective monitoring, state and regional coordination, and early detection and rapid response. The MAPAIS is interested in how existing databases such as the USGS Non-Indigenous Aquatic Species Database can be used to facilitate this process by providing user friendly geospatial maps and versatile technologies to track the occurrence of priority species in the region. http://www.midatlanticpanel.org/resources/publications.htm. Ideally, AIS databases throughout the region would eventually provide coarse to fine scale maps of AIS distribution and temporal occurrence.

**Funds Available:** Up to \$50,000 is available to fund several projects. MAPAIS encourages projects that are in the \$7,000 to \$15,000 range. U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service funds will be administered by the Maryland Department of Natural Resources (MD DNR) and will be awarded as a contract between the individual's institution and MD DNR. Projects that document how the funds can work as "seed money" or to leverage potential future funding are strongly encouraged. Projects that use MAPAIS funds to "add-on" to existing programs and do not specifically address Panel priorities are discouraged.

**Project Duration and Award Period:** Projects must be completed within 2 years of the award date. Start dates are flexible as they are contingent upon completion of the processing of individual awards.

**Eligibility:** Any individuals in federal, state, provincial or local agencies, institutions of higher education, commercial or non-profit organizations, professional, lake, landowner, watershed, tribes, and international organizations are eligible for funding as investigators or cooperators.

**Indirect Costs:** The MAPAIS looks to support a number of small grants from a variety of institutions and does not allow indirect costs. Indirect cost, however, can be included in project match.

**Cost Sharing and Matching:** Although no matching funds or cost sharing arrangements are required, demonstration of in-kind, match or leveraging of funds will be considered favorably in the review process.

**Consultation:** Before submitting a proposal, applicants are encouraged to discuss proposals with their respective MAPAIS state representative. **Proposal Format:** Proposals must include the following information and must not exceed a total of six pages. Please include CVs as appendices – these do not count to the page limit. Please submit all documents as <u>one</u> file (either PDF or MS Word format).

#### A) Project Summary (Page 1)

- 1) Organization Title
- 2) Project Lead and Co-Participants
- 3) Address, Telephone Number, and E-mail address of Project Lead
- 4) Project Title
- 5) Project Duration
- 6) Project Objectives or a Project Abstract

### B) Project Description (maximum 2 - 4 pages)

- 1) Objectives
- 2) Narrative: The project narrative should detail the activities that are to be accomplished during the budget period of the project. This description should include specific methods or activities that are proposed to accomplish the objective(s).
- 3) Benefits or Results Expected
- 4) Outreach Plan: Must explain how the project will connect its findings to the public.
- 5) Project Timeline: Include schedule and specific deliverables of the project, such as publications, educational materials, or workshop reports.
- 6) Previous MAPAIS funding (1-2 paragraphs): If you have received Panel funding previously, please include the title and brief description of the project, amount of funding you received from the Panel, project dates, and the project status.

#### C) Budget and Budget Justification (maximum 2 pages)

Please use the budget table below and omit a category if you have no costs associated with it. Include any cost share contributions. The Budget Justification must summarize the funding needs for your project and link to the categories in the table. Give a cost analysis for each deliverable you identify in the project design. Describe resource commitments of in-kind donations, funds, and/or volunteers from other groups.

**Deadline for Proposal Submission:** Proposals are due no later than 5:00 p.m. on April 1, 2011. Proposals may be sent electronically in MS Word or PDF format via electronic mail to Lisa\_Moss@fws.gov or hard copies may be mailed to:

Those who e-mail their proposals will receive an e-mail acknowledgement.

Proposals will be evaluated and ranked by MAPAIS members. Projects will be ranked according to their technical merit, relevance to Panel priorities, applicability to the region, expertise of participants, outreach component, and potential for successful completion.

#### **Selection Process:**

- Executive Committee members will screen all proposals to determine eligibility and whether projects address program priorities by May of 2011.
- Panel coordinator will provide summaries of the top eligible proposals to MAPAIS members for their review at the May 2011 Panel meeting.
- MAPAIS members will evaluate and rank the projects based on how well they
  address the specific elements of the project design and the budget and cost
  justification.
- Based on available funds and requested funding support, the highest ranked project(s) will receive funding.
- Announcement of awards will occur in June of 2011. Processing of awards will
  occur mid-late summer. Projects must be completed within two years of the start
  date.

#### PROJECT DELIVERABLES

All PIs must submit progress reports prior to MAPAIS meetings and a final report at the completion of the project.

- Award recipients must submit a detailed statement of work as part of the contracting process.
- MAPAIS reserves the right to divert funds to another project if contracted benchmarks are not completed according to plan.
- If projects that are progressing adequately require additional funds, unspent project funds can be requested if other projects are not completed on time.
- It is expected award recipients will present final results upon project completion at a MAPAIS meeting.
